#### "Seeker Thomas"

# This is the Sunday that we will hear "the Doubting Thomas" story in worship.

It is so easy to once again single out someone who comes across a little differently and lay the blame on him. Was Thomas a doubter or was he a person, like many of us "who had to touch and see".

There is an illustrator of sermon truths who asked us to look into the real soul of Thomas and see if we don't see him beyond this, "I must put my hands in his side and my fingers in the print of the nails" in order to believe. Thomas is known for so many

things that are good that it is a shame when we stereotype from only one event. Unfortunately there is much truth to that in our lives also.

The truth of the gospel reveals more of deep substance about the man. For one thing, John tells us that Thomas was

the one who was willing to go to Jerusalem during the worst threats against Jesus' life, and even die there with the master (John 11:16). Furthermore, it was Thomas who was honest enough to tell Jesus that he didn't understand the sometimes cryptic things Jesus would talk about (John 14:5). In other words, Thomas was a simple man in the best sense of the term. He was honest and good and loyal and true. You could count on Thomas. Thomas was well grounded. Thomas lived by convictions, and was even willing to die by them. When Thomas refused to believe in the resurrection of Jesus because he was not with the others on the evening of that first Easter, it was not because he was ornery or cantankerous. It was simply because he had seen too many people go off on wild-goose chases when there was no goose to be had. The traumatic events of Passion Week ought to have made everyone a bit sober, and forced them to realize that wishful thinking is not enough to change reality.

But when Jesus physically appeared to Thomas along with the rest of the dis-

"I must put my hands in his side and my fingers in the print of the nails" in order to believe. ciples a week later, Thomas was willing to change his mind and accept the reality of the resurrection.

We are not even told that Thomas actually touched Jesus. The appearance may well have been

enough.

This story is a reminder to us in those times when we struggle with our own doubts and disbelief. And I must admit I am privy to those times in my own life and in the life of many people I come into contact with. As we seek the real presence of Christ in our lives we can be assured that doubt and disbelief are a natural part of the struggle and our investigation is an opportunity to grow in faithfulness.

### **CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES**

The Church Council met on April 10 at 7:00 p.m. for our regular meeting. In our council devotions this year we are spending time around the theme, **Chosen and Sent**. The specific devotion was "*God's Leaders are SENT*" and was based on Genesis 12:1-3, Matthew 28:16-20 and Mark 16:1-8.

The minutes of the March meeting were reviewed and approved with one typographical correction. Then we received the reports of the Treasurer, Capital Improvement Fund, Sunday school Superintendent (reported 13 students with perfect attendance in March), and Pastor (the 5 year average report that he gives showed that income through March was 21.1 % of the budget goal (**33.34** % is a three month need).

Under Old business the various committee liaisons reported on pertinent activities of their areas of ministry. Worship and Witness shared with the council the church's welcome packet for first time visitors. There was more discussion on the possibility of a new church sign with reader board. Tom Spires and Pastor are getting all of the information and signage requirements of city and TxDot prior to a recommendation from council to the congregation.

Under New business Pastor reported that we have the sampler kit for the new, Evangelical Lutheran Worship, resource. After looking it over he will pass it on to the choir and music leaders. The council approved writing a policy document for active church members to borrow tables and
